At CVCA, we are committed to helping students find healthy “connections” that will help shape and define who they are in the future. Not only do we want to surround students with encouraging and supporting adults they can trust, we also want to help them navigate healthy peer relationships that will last a lifetime.

Connections are small groups that meet once a week with about ten students in the same grade and of the same gender. They are led by a faculty or staff member through Bible study, life discussions, prayer, games, and lots of other fun activities that help students connect to each other, their leader, and ultimately Jesus Christ. Middle schoolers are a social bunch, and relationships are very important to them. The New House System

This year, CVCA began an exciting new program for our high schoolers. The CVCA **House System** is specifically designed to help students find a place of belonging, offer mentoring and leadership opportunities, and create school spirit. High school students are divided into four different houses and are part of the same house for the duration of their high school years:

DOUGLASS HOUSE – Named after abolitionist Frederick Douglass. The virtues of the Douglass House are Justice, Hope, and Truth.

ELLIOT HOUSE – Named after Elisabeth Elliot, who exemplified devotion to God through her ministry of speaking, writing, and academics. The virtues of Elliot House are Sacrifice, Courage, and Trust.



LEWIS HOUSE – Named after C.S. Lewis, one of the 20th century's most influential Christian thinkers and authors. The three virtues of the Lewis House are Wonder, Beauty, and Wisdom.

TOZER HOUSE – Named after A.W. Tozer, a luminary theologian who pointed believers to examine God's holiness and follow Him with zeal. The virtues of the Tozer House are Passion, Knowledge, and Devotion.

Houses are also divided into smaller groups (or floors) that are gender specific. Houses or floors convene on a weekly basis, host events, and participate in competitions. Each of the Houses have different traditions and compete throughout the course of the year for the coveted Royal Cup.



Experiential Learning

How the School of Medical Professions is providing valuable medical experiences for students during a time of COVID restrictions.

COVID-19 has been a challenge the past two years for education in general, but particularly for educational programs that rely on experiential learning and shadow experiences – and are even further restricted due to HIPAA laws. This has been the case for our School of Medical Professions (SOMP). However, because CVCA has been able to meet in person for the past year and half, students have still been able to participate in medical experiences in ways that the program has been designed to do.

JUNIOR YEAR SOMP

For instance, during the SOMP students' junior year they have the opportunity to take a College Credit Plus (CCP) class through Malone University and earn dual credit (a college level course at CVCA and four hours per semester through Malone). Students have been able to use their Anatomy coloring books for creative anatomical learning; participate in labs that feature human models for anatomical identification; and dissect animal model organs as they go through the body's systems, physiological experiments, and case studies that underscore the importance of correct functioning body systems for individual health. During the Fall semester Dr. Emily Scott came to CVCA and talked to students about Allied Health professions.

SENIOR YEAR SOMP

During their senior year, SOMP students have been able to pursue research and presentations in the Medical Senior Seminar course. Because students at the undergraduate level are doing more novel research, it pays off to have them look into how to do it appropriately before graduation. We work through a book together called *How to Write and Publish a Scientific Paper*. This allows us to discuss and do stepwise planning for some research papers and presentations. SOMP seniors also work through Medical Terminology, do further case studies, have additional speakers from various medical professions, and tackle numerous topics relating to wellness and pathology.

MENTORSHIPS

Students from both class years have continued their monthly meetings with mentors. This involvement – which almost exclusively is covered by mentors who have an association with CVCA – has been an undeniable blessing to all of our students. Our Community Liaison, Mrs. Kelly Cook, connects each student to a mentor. She also organizes our Jterm/Mterm experience, which is scheduled for juniors and includes additional opportunities to hear from medical professionals.





We asked Mr. Talbert to tell us a little bit more about himself and his time at CVCA:



Why did you want to be a part of Multicultural Belonging?

When I was in college, my mentor invited me to a Multicultural Student Union meeting that changed my life. At that meeting I heard a vision of Kingdom diversity and how it was a deep desire of Jesus. I hope to cast that vision for students at CVCA.

What do you hope to bring to CVCA in this role? I hope to be a safe and relatable figure for students to process issues around diversity and belonging. I know how difficult it can be to be a minority in a predominantly majority culture institution. I can be a voice for minority students and a voice of unity for all students.

What makes CVCA's community unique when it comes to diversity? At CVCA we have global diversity. Our diversity is bigger than black and white. We have international students, first generation Americans, and families from all over the world.

What did you do before coming to CVCA and what have you been up to while here? I am a proud Bible teacher here at CVCA, Go Royals! Before that I was a youth pastor at the North Canton Chapel for five years. Now, alongside teaching, I'm a pastor at Citizens Akron Church, a multi-ethnic church in the Middlebury neighborhood of Akron.

SIT, WALK, STAND

a study through ephesians



Rallying under our Banner

Every year we choose a book of the Bible to study in Chapel, and that becomes our **Chapel Banner** for the year. The imagery of a banner is one we see in the Old Testament – it was something to rally people under. At CVCA, even though students and faculty attend over 200 different churches, live in different cities, and come from a variety of different backgrounds, the Banner that we rally under is Jesus Christ. We follow Jesus; we lift Him high; we celebrate His life, death, and resurrection; and are linked together because of Him.

One very specific way we honor Jesus is by valuing his Word, so this year we are studying the book of Ephesians. We've entitled our Banner: **SIT, WALK, STAND**. Posture communicates a lot. Think about how much a person can say through their posture, whether it is standing at a wedding or giving a standing ovation at a concert. We find in the book of Ephesians three distinct positions that communicate a progression in our lives as believers.

The first is **SIT**. This posture describes the position of the Christian in relation to God through Christ. The Christian life starts not with a big “do” but a big “done.” He has invited us into a relationship, and in Him we sit and rest. Ephesians 2:6 says, “*he raised us up with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places in Christ Jesus.*” Paul goes on to paint a picture of who we are if we are seated in Christ. We are chosen, adopted, forgiven, and have obtained an inheritance (just to name a few!)

The second word in our banner is **WALK**. The Christian life doesn't end with sitting but continues with the working out of our salvation. Not only are we saved *from* something (sin/death), but we are saved *for* something (good works) and have been called to walk with the Lord. Ephesians 2:8-9 says, “*For by grace you have been saved through faith. And this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast. For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand, that we should walk in them.*” Ephesians 5:1-2 continues this image of walking when it says, “*Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children. And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.*” A natural response to the grace we've been given is to live a life for God – to walk with Him.

The final word of our banner is **STAND**. As believers we need to remember that we fight not against flesh and blood but against spiritual forces (Ephesians 6:12). We are called to stand firm – not passively but rather standing our ground for the sake of the Gospel. In a culture that is ever shifting away from Biblical moorings, believers are to stand their ground. Our response is to stand firm. Ephesians 6:13 says, “*Therefore take up the whole armor of God, that you may be able to withstand in the evil day, and having done all, to stand firm.*”

The Chapel Banner imagery (above) has a progression of three movements (left to right): **SIT...WALK... STAND**.

SIT: Rest and know who we are in Christ.

WALK: Live out our faith in our relationships with God and others.

STAND: Firmly follow our orders to stand together knowing that we are a part of a spiritual battle.

asked Nick what it's like to be back as a coach for his alma mater.

Why did you want to return to CVCA?

My main responsibilities are managing the Royals Fieldhouse and coordinating outside groups that use our space when CVCA teams aren't. I also work with our coaches to help bolster and improve our sports camps and clinics that run throughout the year. Camps are a great opportunity for new families to get a feel for CVCA and a sense for what our student-athletes and coaches are all about.

How have you seen CVCA change since your time here as a student?

The biggest changes are in the facilities. It feels like a completely different school from when I went here, which was almost 15 years ago! It is incredible to see how the school is growing and the ways students are impacted because of it.

What gets you excited about the future of CVCA?

We are always looking to improve and be better at CVCA. Not a lot of schools or organizations have that mindset, but it is the truth here. As a school, when we grow and improve it's energizing. I know there are people here trying to be better every day, and it shows

in how CVCA has grown – and will continue to grow. We want to be the best place in the country to attend school, and that can be our barometer of where we are. To be part of that is exciting.

Why do you love coaching? Coaching allows me the opportunity to impact and influence young people's lives. I learned so much, and a large part of who I am today is because of the coaches I had in high school at CVCA and in college. The opportunity to help kids grow in all areas of life – personally, athletically, and spiritually – is why I love doing what I do. It's what drives me to continue to improve and get better myself.

What has it been like coaching with your brother? Coaching with Jack has been great. We are both fierce competitors and have a strong love for CVCA. We are very close and are driven to build a successful program. We are also both very relational and care deeply for the guys we coach. Jack has been a great partner since the day I accepted the job. We were both a part of state championship soccer teams when we were here, and we are both focused on bringing another state championship to CVCA with this program.

Royals Fall Season Review
